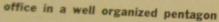
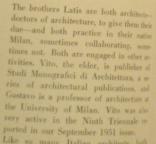

The repetition of the X-brace is a motif giving order to the general composition Note that despite the rich and well-filled look. the room is actually devoid of clutter, the cabinets (opposite page) light, small, and neatly detailed, and the executive desk really a table without heavy underpinnings, though recherché in shape and executed in contrasting woods.

The office-conference room illustrated here, as well as the individual objects with which it is furnished, emphasize an perhaps even more important than the caliber of their design in catching and holding the attention of observers through out the world: this is their inventiveness Although in final visual impact there is nothing startling about this interior (in

deed there ought not to be, considering its staid and businesslike purpose), it is interesting that so many of the items, and the organization of the space itself, are "originals"—creative solutions both esthetically and from the standpoint of mechanical construction. The brothers did not wish to design a startling interior, yet they went to the trouble of designing every item-of inventing an original "method" for each. Only the rug, the carpet, the lamp, the drapery material, and the map were conceived and executed by others. There is no stock furniture here. This may partly result from the greater svailability of skilled craftsmen, but we are told by some New York architects that special order designs cost no more than very good stock furniture in this country either so perhaps a basic attitude is involved.

This office, so well fitted into a fantasfically difficult space afforded by an oldremodeled building, contains nothing that would offend a staid, conservative, American business executive, nor a bright quant-gardiste either. It is plushy, solid impressive, in the best of taste -O. C.
